### **On the Approval of the National Action Plan for the Implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on Women, Peace, and Security for the period until 2025**

*{As amended by the Order of the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine [No. 1150-r dated 16.12.2022](#)}*

1. To approve the [National Action Plan for the Implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security for the period until 2025](#) (hereinafter referred to as the National Plan), which is attached.

2. The ministries, other central executive bodies, the Council of Ministers of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea, the regional state administrations, and the Kyiv and Sevastopol City State Administrations shall ensure:

implementation of the National Plan within the limits of expenditures allocated to the bodies responsible for its implementation;

submission of information on the status of the National Plan implementation to the Ministry of Social Policy by 10 February each year for its generalization and submission to the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine by 1 March.

3. The Council of Ministers of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea, the Regional State Administrations, the Kyiv and Sevastopol City State Administrations/Regional Military Administrations, and the Kyiv City Military Administration shall amend their local action plans for the implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security within a period of three months.

4. To recommend that local governments, the State Judicial Administration, the Security Service, the Office of the Prosecutor General, the National School of Judges, and Ukroboronprom State Concern ensure the implementation of the National Plan within their respective powers.

5. To recommend that the state bodies which belong to the security and defence sector of Ukraine develop and approve their departmental plans aimed at implementing the National Plan.

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## **NATIONAL ACTION PLAN for the Implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security until 2025**

### **General Issues**

The National Plan was developed in accordance with the Laws of Ukraine [“On Ensuring Equal Rights and Opportunities for Women and Men”](#), [“On Principles of Internal and Foreign Policy”](#), and [“On Ensuring the Rights and Freedoms of Citizens and the Legal Regime in the Temporarily Occupied Territory of Ukraine”](#); the Decree of the President of Ukraine dated 30 September 2019 [No. 722](#) “On the Sustainable Development Goals of Ukraine until 2030”; and the Resolution of the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine dated 12 June 2020 No. 471 “On the Approval of the Programme of Activities of the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine” to ensure the implementation of UN Security Council resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security, adopted by the UN Security Council on 31 October 2000, and UN Security Council resolutions 1820, 1888, 1889, 1960, 2106, 2122, 2242, 2467, 2493, which collectively form the Women, Peace and Security agenda.

The National Plan takes into account a number of international obligations of Ukraine in the field of human rights, in particular regarding the achievement of the UN Sustainable Development Goals until 2030, set by the UN General Assembly resolution 70/1 adopted on 25 September 2015; implementation of the [Beijing Declaration](#) adopted on 15 September 1995 at the Fourth World Conference on Women; the [United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women](#) and its [Optional Protocol](#); the [Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings](#); the [Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons, Especially Women and Children, supplementing the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime](#); and the [Association Agreement between Ukraine, of the one part, and](#)

the European Union, the European Atomic Energy Community and their Member States, of the other part.

In support of Euro-Atlantic integration, the National Plan pays due consideration to the priorities set by the Annual National Programme under the auspices of the NATO-Ukraine Commission. By its structure and content, the Programme is based on NATO recommendations and the public authorities' priority activities, particularly those regarding the reforms in the security and defence sector and ensuring equal rights and opportunities for women and men.

The Global Study "Preventing Conflict, Transforming Justice, Securing the Peace", conducted by UN Women, found that women's empowerment contributes to countering violent extremism, advancing the success of peace negotiations and the achievement of durable peace, and accelerates economic recovery, as well as strengthens peacekeeping operations and increases humanitarian aid effectiveness.

UN Security Council resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security covers the following areas of activity:

ensuring the full and equal participation of women and men in decision-making at all levels, including in peace negotiations, peacebuilding, reintegration and reconciliation, participation in elections (both as candidates and voters) and in social and political activities;

the prevention of gender-based violence, including through prosecution for violations of international law; ensuring the participation of women in the prevention, spread and resumption of violent conflicts, as well as the elimination of the causes of their occurrence, in particular through disarmament, counteraction to all forms of exploitation, and support for peace initiatives and conflict resolution processes;

the protection of rights and consideration of the needs of victims during and after conflicts, in particular protection against various forms of violence and harassment (as during protracted conflicts, women and girls are particularly at high risk of trafficking, sexual violence and rape);

addressing the special needs of women and girls, including vulnerable categories (refugees, internally displaced persons, survivors of gender-based violence and conflict-related sexual violence), as well as women combatants and women veterans during the provision of services in the field of health care as well as psychological and humanitarian assistance; ensuring the participation of women in economic recovery and transitional justice during conflict and post-conflict situations.

The necessity to develop a National Plan arose due to the expiration of the National Action Plan for the Implementation of UN Security Council resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security until 2020. Due to the full-scale invasion of Ukraine by the Russian Federation in 2022, the introduction of martial law and the temporary occupation of new territories of Ukraine by the Russian Federation, existing challenges and problems are being actualized and new ones are emerging, have arisen that are not addressed in the National Plan for the period until 2020.

During the implementation of the National Plan until 2020, significant systemic changes took place, in particular the lifting of the ban forbidding women sergeants from holding combat positions in the Armed Forces; the adoption of the Law of Ukraine "On the Amendments to Certain Laws of Ukraine Concerning Ensuring Equal Rights and Opportunities for Women and Men During Military Service in the Armed Forces of Ukraine and Other Military Formations"; permission granted for the recruitment of girls to military and naval lyceums; conducted of a number of training events for specialists in the security and defence sector and educational activities for the population; continuation

of professional training for the specialists of central and local executive bodies on the Women, Peace and Security agenda; and improvements made to the system of protection for women and girls affected by conflict (identification, assistance, information on assistance).

Effective measures must be taken to ensure women's participation in peace processes and post-conflict recovery, the protection of victims of armed conflict, and the prevention of and counteraction to gender-based and conflict-related sexual violence with consideration of the needs and interests of women and men during post-conflict recovery.

The National Plan was developed in accordance with the principles of results-oriented management, based on the results of consultations held in separate regions and with the participation of community experts and the public.

The National Plan aims to ensure:

the participation of women in decision-making;

resilience to security challenges;

post-conflict recovery and transitional justice;

counteraction to gender-based and conflict-related sexual violence;

strengthening of the institutional capacity of the executors of the National Plan.

Particular attention has been paid to the needs of various groups of women and men, girls and boys affected by conflict, as well as to systematic informing on their rights and the progress made on the National Plan's implementation.

## **Problem Analysis**

In 2014, the armed aggression of the Russian Federation against Ukraine and temporary occupation of part of its territory by the Russian Federation started in Ukraine. The armed aggression disproportionately affects women and men, primarily the civilian population.

Inequality in women's and men's access to decision-making processes and resources, as well as the existence of stereotypes about the role of women and men in public and political life, adversely affects the representation and participation of women in such processes.

Thus, in 2020, only two women from Ukraine, who are responsible for humanitarian and socio-economic issues, were included in the Trilateral Contact Group for the Peaceful Settlement of the Situation in Certain Territories of Eastern Ukraine.

At the same time, women remain more vulnerable to the adverse effects of the armed aggression. Based on the official statistics, women constitute most of the internally displaced persons, unemployed internally displaced persons, survivors of gender-based violence and other vulnerable groups. According to the information available in the Unified Information Database on Internally Displaced Persons, 1,477,114 internally displaced persons from the temporarily occupied territories of Donetsk and Luhansk oblasts, the Autonomous Republic of Crimea and the city of Sevastopol were registered as of 1 January 2022, with women comprising 59 per cent. The share of women among unemployed internally displaced persons constitutes 63 per cent.

The National System of Monitoring the Situation of Internally Displaced Persons Report (2019) notes that the share of employed internally displaced women constituted 43 per cent, and men -58 per cent. Women constituted 90 per cent of respondents engaged in domestic and care work for children and other persons in the household. Forced displacement has a negative impact on all citizens, but given the manifestations of discrimination and gender stereotypes, its impact on women is much more severe and is clearly evident in their restricted employment opportunities, lower income, greater

dependency on social benefits, larger amounts of unpaid domestic work and, accordingly, in shrinking opportunities for their participation in public and political life.

Since the full-scale invasion of Ukraine by the Russian Federation on 24 February 2022, almost one third of Ukrainians have been forced to leave their homes.

According to the report by the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights “The situation of human rights in Ukraine in the context of the armed attack by the Russian Federation, 24 February to 15 May 2022”, displacement has disproportionately affected women due to the growing burden of caring for children and other family members requiring care, children, elderly, people with disabilities and other groups with limited mobility.

A new social group of women veterans emerged in connection with the armed aggression of the Russian Federation in the east of Ukraine. Based on the data of the Unified Register of Participants of the Anti-Terrorist Operation/Joint Forces Operation, which is the responsibility of the Ministry of Veterans Affairs of Ukraine, more than 16,500 women (4.2 per cent of the total number of combatants) had received their combatant status as of 1 April 2020.

The spread of the acute respiratory disease COVID-19, caused by the SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus, has become another security challenge. In this context, the issue of access to information, justice, education, employment, healthcare and social services, and social integration is particularly acute for vulnerable groups of women and men.

One of the problems is gender-based violence, including conflict-related sexual violence. According to the results of the Well-Being and Safety of Women Survey conducted by the Organization Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) in 2019, 67 per cent of Ukrainian women victims of violence had experienced physical, psychological or sexual violence since the age of 15.

Multiple cases of conflict-related sexual violence perpetrated by military personnel of the Russian Federation have been recorded in all territories of Ukraine liberated by the Armed Forces, including in Kherson, Kharkiv, Chernihiv, Sumy, Zaporizhzhia, Kyiv, Donetsk, and Luhansk regions.

Women and girls constitute the majority of the victims, and the most common form of conflict-related sexual violence is rape, including gang rape. The Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights is studying the information on these cases.

At the same time, the number of allegations of conflict-related sexual violence is increasing, although it is still hard to assess the extent of these crimes, as survivors are often unwilling or unable to be interviewed. Interaction between the actors involved in preventing and responding to gender-based violence is complicated, and law enforcement agencies have limited capacity to investigate conflict-related sexual violence.

There is no effective mechanism to identify and monitor potential security challenges in a broad sense (interventions in defence, conflict, violence, natural disasters, and epidemics, etc.) considering gender aspects in the context of national security on a national scale, and informing the population about them.

Significant obstacles to the implementation of UN Security Council resolution 1325 on Women, Peace and Security include the lack of knowledge and skills of the National Plan actors, limited human and material resources and limited technical support.

Integrating the needs and concerns of conflict-affected women and women involved in the settlement of the international armed conflict is required to address the effects of the armed aggression of the Russian Federation against Ukraine, manage its consequences and protect human rights in Ukraine. Article 4 of the UN Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women provides for the adoption of temporary special measures aimed at accelerating de facto

equality between women and men (these measures shall be discontinued when the objectives of equality of opportunity and treatment have been achieved).

## **Objective, Main Target Groups and Principles of the National Plan**

The National Plan's objective is to create conditions for the equal participation of women and men in conflict resolution, peacebuilding, recovery, security challenges, and systemic responses to gender-based violence and conflict-related violence.

The National Plan focuses on the following groups of women and men, girls and boys:

internally displaced persons;

survivors of conflict-related violence, including sexual violence;

victims of torture held captive by illegal armed groups;

persons vulnerable to trafficking, sexual violence, rape and torture;

persons with disabilities, older adults and other groups with limited mobility living in the territories close to the areas of military (combat) actions (contact line);

persons living in the military (combat) action areas;

persons who make decisions related to conflict resolution and security issues, as well as:

- women serving/working in the security and defence sector;
- women involved in peacekeeping activities;

persons in the security and defence sector who have suffered from gender-based violence, including psychological violence, and sexual harassment;

men and boys targeted by educational and other programmes.

The National Plan is based on the following principles:

results-oriented management as an approach and the tool for the implementation of government programmes, which makes it possible to identify the direct beneficiaries of programmes and take into account their problems and needs, focus on achieving the desired results, monitor the progress towards achieving the qualitative and quantitative indicators, identify deviations and make respective decisions, and report on the results and the impact of the programme on the condition of the beneficiaries, the resolution of their problems and the resources used;

assurance of equal rights and opportunities for women and men and non-discrimination;

subsidiarity, which implies that local executive bodies effectively solve problems at the local level;

integrity, which provides the development of mutually agreed regulations aimed at implementing the Women, Peace and Security agenda;

objectivity and validity of the provisions of the National Plan to identify the existing problems, assess them and find the best options for solving them based on the administrative data, statistical information and monitoring of human rights and freedoms conducted by state executive bodies, local self-government bodies, civil society institutions and international organizations;

openness and transparency during the National Plan's fulfilment to maximize the involvement of all stakeholders in its implementation and monitoring;

results-oriented monitoring of the National Plan and periodic evaluation of its impact and effectiveness;

ensuring timely response to new challenges.

### **The National Plan Actors**

The primary implementer of the National Plan is the Ministry of Social Policy.

Institutions responsible for the implementation of the National Plan include the Ministry of Defence, the Ministry of Internal Affairs, the Ministry of Strategic Industries, the Ministry of Reintegration of the Temporarily Occupied Territories, the Ministry of Veterans Affairs, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Education and Science, the Ministry of Justice, the Ministry of Culture and Information Policy, the Ministry of Youth and Sports, the Ministry of Economy, the Ministry of Communities and Territories Development, the Ministry of Environmental Protection and Natural Resources, the National Police, the Administration of the State Border Guard Service, the State Migration Service, the National Guard, the State Emergency Service, the Security Service, the General Staff of the Armed Forces, the National Social Service, the Administration of the State Service of Special Communications and Information Protection, the State Committee for Television and Radio Broadcasting, the Office of the Prosecutor General, the State Judicial Administration, the National Agency for Civil Service Affairs, the State Employment Centre, the State Bureau of Investigation, the Coordination Centre for Legal Aid Provision, the National Academy of Sciences, territorial subdivisions/military units/detachments of bodies of the security and defence sector, educational institutions of the security and defence sector, higher education institutions that provide master's degree programmes in public administration and management, the National School of Judges, the Prosecutors Training Centre, the Academy of Advocacy of Ukraine, the Higher School of Advocacy of the National Bar Association, the Council of Ministers of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea, regional state administrations, the Kyiv and Sevastopol City State Administrations/Regional Military Administrations and the Kyiv City Military Administration, local self-government bodies, civil associations, and international organizations.

### **Strategic and Operational Goals and the Main Tasks Ensuring the Achievement of the Strategic Goals**

#### *Participation of Women in Decision-Making*

Strategic goal 1. Ensuring the equal participation of women and men in decision-making on conflict prevention, conflict resolution and post-conflict recovery at all levels and in all areas, including the security and defence sector.



Operational goal 1.1. Creating regulatory conditions and opportunities for the equal participation of women and men in peace negotiations and decision-making on conflict prevention, conflict resolution, the provision of assistance to victims and post-conflict recovery.

Tasks:

ensuring the equal participation of women and men in supervisory boards of state-owned enterprises in the security and defence sector;

determining a mechanism for taking into account the needs of women and men in peace negotiations and post-conflict recovery;

selecting and training women for participation in international peacekeeping and security operations;

conducting educational activities and information campaigns for security and defence sector specialists to facilitate the involvement of women in peacekeeping processes;

providing women in the security and defence sector with infrastructure facilities and logistical support that meet their needs;

creating conditions for employees that facilitate the combining of functions and responsibilities in professional and private life, in particular in the security and defence sector;

improving the documents regulating individual behaviour and corporate ethics with regard to combating sexism, sexual harassment, psychological and sexual violence, discrimination during recruitment, performance of official duties and participation in decision-making;

ensuring women's and men's equal access to security and defence education institutions at all levels and gender mainstreaming in the educational process;

providing appropriate conditions for the professional development of women working in state and local self-government bodies, as well as women from among the rank and file and the senior staff of the civil protection service, female students of higher education institutions and military higher education institutions, and target groups of the National Plan.

Operational goal 1.2. Ensuring the equal representation of women and men in decision-making in the security and defence sector.

Tasks:

ensuring the equal participation of women and men in staff, certification, personnel and official investigations commissions;

creating conditions for monitoring the appointment of women to managerial positions.

Operational goal 1.3. Ensuring the involvement of civil society institutions in decision-making in the area of supporting and promoting a culture of peace, peacebuilding, post-conflict recovery and assistance to victims of conflict.

Task: creating conditions for the participation of civil society institutions, including self-organizing bodies of the population and activists, in the implementation of the Women, Peace and Security agenda.

### *Resilience to Security Challenges*

Strategic goal 2. Creating a gender-sensitive system to detect, prevent and respond to security challenges.

Operational goal 2.1. Ensuring the availability of an effective mechanism of interaction between state bodies, public associations, enterprises, institutions and organizations to detect, prevent and respond to security challenges (wars, pandemics, human-made disasters, etc.) with consideration of the needs of different groups of girls and boys, women and men.

Tasks:

defining the mechanism of interaction between public authorities to identify security challenges and respond to them with the involvement of representatives of civil society, in particular women and girls;

ensuring that a gender component is taken into account when forming the composition of headquarters and commissions responsible for responding to security challenges and challenges in their work;

ensuring that infrastructure, especially critical infrastructure, meets the requirements for identifying, preventing and responding to potential security threats using a gender approach and inclusive approach.

Operational goal 2.2. Ensuring the ability of the population of Ukraine, in particular women and girls, to detect, prevent and respond to security challenges in accordance with existing instructions, legislation, the level of security challenges and individuals' own needs.

Tasks:

ensuring skills development among different social groups of the population to detect, prevent and respond to security challenges;

creating an early warning system for the population to alert them about the dangers associated with armed conflict (notifications of escalating hostilities, demining, mined objects, etc.), which includes gender-sensitive indicators and measures;

increasing the capacity of local communities to manage conflict prevention and conflict resolution processes;

including topics on territorial security audit issues in the educational programmes of actors responding to security challenges, gender-based violence and conflict-related violence.

#### *Post-Conflict Recovery and Transitional Justice*

Strategic goal 3. Ensuring the process of post-conflict recovery, development and implementation of the transitional justice system based on the principles of ensuring equal rights and opportunities for women and men.

Operational goal 3.1. Defining the social and political dialogue regarding post-conflict recovery and the development of recovery/transitional justice for women that is sensitive to the needs of women and men (girls and boys) affected by the conflict.

Tasks:

coordinating those activities of the subjects of interaction that ensure the formation and implementation of post-conflict recovery programmes;

training specialists on the provision of preventive psychological assistance to victims of conflict;

providing reliable sources of communication on post-conflict recovery.

Operational goal 3.2. Identifying the specific needs of conflict-affected persons, in particular women, taking into account a gender perspective in the provision of administrative, medical and social services.

Tasks:

ensuring regular assessment and analysis of the needs and availability of administrative, medical and social services, including the provision of legal assistance to various groups of women and men affected by the conflict;

conducting consultations and providing the necessary and comprehensive humanitarian, medical, social and psychological assistance to victims of conflict;

scaling up capacities to support self-employment and entrepreneurship for women, including internally displaced persons, women veterans and other persons affected by conflict;

Operational goal 3.3. Identifying appropriate mechanisms for documenting, assessing and compensating the losses of survivors of conflict-related violence using a gender-sensitive approach and bringing the perpetrators to justice.

Tasks:

determining, in accordance with international standards, a mechanism for documenting and assessing harm from conflict-related violence;

ensuring that citizens living in war-affected areas have access to information on how to act in a crisis, document the damage caused and seek redress.

Operational goal 3.4. Ensuring compliance of transitional justice legislation with international standards, its application and access to justice for affected women and men, girls and boys.

Tasks:

bringing legislation in the field of transitional justice in line with international standards (the Istanbul Protocol, the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court, and the International Protocol on the Documentation and Investigation of Sexual Violence in Conflict);

ensuring qualified consideration of cases in the field of transitional justice and the cases of persons affected by conflict;

supporting of women staying in the temporarily occupied territories and/or under the jurisdiction of other States, including women living in the areas of military (combat) actions, those being held captive, those forcibly taken to the Russian Federation, and women who have been forced to go abroad.

### *Combating Gender-Based Violence and Conflict-Related Sexual Violence*

Strategic goal 4. Providing protection against gender-based violence and sexual violence (in situations of armed conflict and in peacetime).

Operational goal 4.1. Establishing an inter-agency detection and response system that provides the conditions for comprehensive, timely protection and access to justice for survivors of gender-based violence and conflict-related sexual violence in situations of armed conflict.

Tasks:

developing tools to record crimes against life and health, sexual freedom and inviolability, honour and dignity in situations of conflict in accordance with UN and NATO standards;

identifying institutional mechanisms for the proper response, documentation and investigation of crimes against life and health, sexual freedom and inviolability, honour and dignity in situations of conflict;

conducting regular monitoring and evaluation of cases of crimes committed in the context of the conflict.

Operational goal 4.2. Establishing an inter-agency detection and response system to ensure comprehensive, timely protection and access to justice for survivors of gender-based violence and conflict-related sexual violence in peacetime.

Tasks:

introducing amendments to existing legislation in terms of combating gender-based violence in accordance with international standards;

ensuring the tracking of cases of gender-based violence and an appropriate response to such cases;

ensuring systematic monitoring of the response system to address gender-based and conflict-related violence.

Operational goal 4.3. Providing comprehensive assistance to survivors of gender-based violence and conflict-related sexual violence, taking into account the specific needs of those affected during situations of armed conflict and in peacetime.

Tasks:

developing a mechanism to ensure effective and timely assistance to survivors of gender-based violence, in particular victims of conflict-related sexual violence, including victims (and potential victims) of human trafficking;

providing effective and timely assistance to survivors of gender-based violence.

Operational goal 4.4. Ensuring that effective mechanisms are in place to prevent gender-based violence, sexual harassment and conflict-related sexual violence.

Tasks:

introducing systematic public awareness-raising on preventing and combating gender-based violence, sexual harassment and conflict-related sexual violence;

preventing violence by violence-prone individuals.

*Institutional Capacity of the National Plan Actors*

Strategic goal 5. Ensuring the developed institutional capacity of the National Plan actors for the effective implementation of the Women, Peace and Security agenda in accordance with international standards.

Operational goal 5.1. Ensuring sufficient knowledge and skills of the National Plan actors for the effective implementation of the tasks identified in the Women, Peace and Security agenda in accordance with international standards.

Tasks:

ensuring the opportunity to systematically acquire the knowledge and skills needed to fulfil the tasks of the Women, Peace, Security agenda, in accordance with the UN and NATO standards;  
providing training and retraining of security and defence sector personnel.

Operational goal 5.2. Implementation of an effective system of cross-sectoral cooperation at the local, regional and national levels as well as institutional mechanisms, including in the security and defence sector, for the development, implementation and monitoring of the implementation of the National Plan.

Task:

ensuring inter-agency cooperation and coordination of activities of state bodies, international organizations and public associations on the development, implementation and monitoring of the implementation of the National Plan;

ensuring systematic and comprehensive monitoring and evaluation of the implementation of the tasks of the Women, Peace and Security agenda and taking their results into account during further implementation of the National Plan.

The Action Plan for the Implementation of the National Plan is provided in Annex 1.

Monitoring the implementation of the National Plan is carried out by analysing the achievement of key indicators of the targets and their deviation from the target values, determining the reasons for their deviation, and conducting an analysis of the implementation status of the tasks and activities of the National Plan.

The goal of monitoring is the timely identification and resolution of problems that hinder the achievement of the ultimate goal of the National Plan, as well as the preparation and publication of results-based reports on its implementation.

The Plan for Monitoring the Implementation of the National Plan is provided in Annex 2.

Monitoring the National Plan's implementation is carried out by the:

collection of information on the indicators' achievement of the general objective and its subsequent submission to the Ministry of Social Policy based on the results of the third and final years of the National Plan's implementation. The information is provided by central executive bodies, other state bodies involved in the implementation of the National Plan, the Council of Ministers of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea, regional state administrations, and the Kyiv and Sevastopol City State Administrations;

collection of information on the achievement of the indicators of the operational and strategic goals of the National Plan and its subsequent submission to the Ministry of Social Policy based on the results of each year of the National Plan's implementation. The information is provided by central executive bodies, other state bodies involved in the implementation of the National Plan, the Council of Ministers of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea, regional state administrations, and the Kyiv and Sevastopol City State Administrations.

Achievement of the National Plan's strategic goals is facilitated by the implementation of regulations, the list of which is provided in Annex 3.

Evaluation is performed during the last year of the National Plan's implementation, in particular through:

analysis of the impact of the National Plan's implementation on the living conditions of the target groups;

analysis of the achieved key indicators towards the overall goal of the National Plan, their deviation from the planned markers, and investigation of the reasons for such deviation;

analysis of the reasonableness and validity of the selected tools for implementation of the National Plan, the identified approaches, and the need for their revision or extension;

analysis of the National Plan`s impact on the situation of target groups;

Based on the evaluation results, the Ministry of Social Policy prepares and submits to the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine a report on the National Plan`s evaluation in the format in accordance with [Annex 4](#).

The report is published for public discussion on the Ministry of Social Policy`s official website on an annual basis no later than five working days after its submission to the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine.

Actors of the National Plan submit information on the achievement of the indicators of the operational and strategic goals of the National Plan to the Ministry of Social Policy on an annual basis for its finalization and submission to the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine, indicating:

the current status of the National Plan`s implementation;

the share of the indicators and goals achieved (percentage);

a list of major achievements, as well as issues of concern for the specified period;

proposals for solving the issues of concern;

the goals and tasks specified in the plan for monitoring the implementation status of the National Plan, as well as the indicators, their target and actual values in the reporting period, their difference, and an analysis of the progress or reasons for deviations from the target value.

Implementation of the National Plan is ensured at the expense of and within the budget allocations to the central executive bodies, other state bodies, the Council of Ministers of the Autonomous Republic of Crimea, regional state administrations, and the Kyiv and Sevastopol City State Administrations for the relevant period, and of other sources not prohibited by law, taking into account the goals, tasks and priorities identified by the:

[Programme of activities of the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine](#), approved by the Resolution of the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine dated 12 June 2020, No. 471 (in particular the respective concepts of state policy);

annual message of the President of Ukraine to the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine “On the Internal and External Situation of Ukraine”;

Ukraine`s international obligations.

The National Plan can be updated, if necessary, based on the results of monitoring its implementation status, which is carried out no more than once a year.
